Dalmatian Breeding Expenses for your first Litter of 8 Puppies Sold at \$2000 each

Assuming you already own your female, she is young and healthy and you have breeding rights.

As you will see the math says 8 pups raised for 4 months and adopted out for \$2000 each for a total of \$16,000 may result in a "profit" of \$4000-\$6000.

All it really takes to loose money quickly is to not place all 8 pups for full price, or for you to have an Emergency Vet issue.

More pups equals more income, which means more costs in BAER testing, DNA testing, Vet Exams, Food, Taxes and Supplies.

While these amounts might seem high to you, they are actually quite standard. As a few items are re-usable as noted, most are consumed each litter.

For those of you thinking you can do it cheaper, take a look at this list and what are you going to eliminate? Quality of food? Vet care? Not pay taxes?
